

## Good Faith Estimate

**You have the right to receive a “Good Faith Estimate” explaining how much your medical care will cost.**

There is a new act that went into effect January 1, 2022 called the No Surprises Act. Under this Act, health care providers must to give patients/consumers who do not have insurance or who are not using insurance an estimate of the bill for medical items and services.

- You have the right to receive a Good Faith Estimate for the total expected cost of any non-emergency services. This includes mental health services.
- Your health care provider shall give you a Good Faith Estimate in writing at least 1 business day before your medical service. You may ask your health care provider, and any other provider you choose, for a Good Faith Estimate before you schedule service. The Good Faith Estimate shall be a written document that is clear, understandable, and be orally provided.
- If you receive a bill that is at least \$400 more than your Good Faith Estimate, you may dispute the bill.
- Make sure to save a copy or picture of your Good Faith Estimate.
